Susan R. Bailey, MD

Dr. Susan R. Bailey an allergist/immunologist from Fort Worth, Texas, was elected president of the American Medical Association in June 2020. Previously, she served as speaker of the AMA House of Delegates for four years and as vice speaker for four years.



Dr. Bailey, who has been active in the AMA since medical school when she served as chair of the AMA Medical Student Section, has held numerous leadership positions with the AMA. These include serving as chair of both the Advisory Panel on Women in Medicine and the AMA Council on Medical Education, and representing the AMA on the Accreditation Council for Continuing Medical Education, the American Board of Medical Specialties, and COLA.

Her long history of service in helping guide organized medicine extends to the local and state levels, as well. She has served as board chair and president of the Tarrant County Medical Society, and as vice speaker, speaker and president of the Texas Medical Association.

Dr. Bailey is an allergist in private practice, and has been with Fort Worth Allergy and Asthma Associates for over 30 years. She completed her residency in general pediatrics and a fellowship in allergy/immunology at the Mayo Graduate School of Medicine in Rochester, Minnesota, and is board certified in allergy and immunology, and pediatrics and has been awarded the title of Distinguished Fellow of the American College of Allergy, Asthma, and Immunology.

In addition to receiving her medical degree with honors from the Texas A&M University College of Medicine as a member of its charter class, Dr. Bailey was later appointed to the Texas A&M System Board of Regents by then Gov. George W. Bush, and has been named a Distinguished Alumnus of Texas A&M University and of Texas A&M University College of Medicine.

Dr. Kristian Black is a first-year urology resident at the University of Michigan where he also received his medical degree and masters in clinical research. While completing his masters, his research interests were divided among investigating the mechanics of holmium laser lithotripsy, and stone composition recognition utilizing deep learning computer vision. Spurred by his passion for increasing medical diversity and inclusion, Kristian also began using modeling frameworks from his graduate course in cost-effective analysis to investigate how changes in American demographics could exacerbate lack of racial and ethnic diversity in the urologic workforce. In response to data showing increasing discordance among populations of minority providers and patients, Kristian developed UroVersity—a culturally intuitive mentorship-based pipeline initiative. This unique program seeks not only to recruit and retain underrepresented students but also to address obstructing cultural barriers in mentor-mentee relationships through the implementation of a culturally aware training module. Seth A. Cohen, MD

Outside of work he enjoys squash, bicycling, skiing, and traveling.

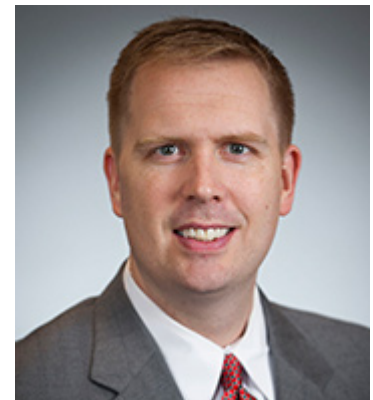
Ronald Lee Davis III, MD, MBA, FACS

Logan Holtgrewe Legislative Fellowship and served as a health policy fellow in the office of U.S. Senator Bill Cassidy, MD. He was previously a fellow at the U.S. Food and Drug Administration and a program evaluation consultant to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. He serves on the AUA Political Action Committee board of directors and was the inaugural chair of the AUA Policy and Advocacy Resident Work Group.

Dr. Koo is a graduate of the Yale School of Medicine and holds master's degrees from the Harvard School of Public Health and the University of Cambridge. He completed residency at Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center and fellowship at Johns Hopkins University.

Lori B. Lerner, MD

Dr. Lori Lerner is an associate professor of urology at Boston University School of Medicine, and serves as both chief of urology and deputy chief of surgery at VA Boston Healthcare System. She is an expert in laser surgery, male voiding dysfunction, benign prostate surgical therapies, and “big open whacks.” She completed fellowship training in HoLEP and laser surgery in New Zealand. For the majority of her 20-year career, she has been within the VA system. However, she spent six years splitting time between the VA and Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center through a sharing agreement prior to moving to Boston in 2007. In addition, she spent three years in private practice at a community affiliate of Beth Israel Deaconess Hospital outside Boston from 2014 to 2017, then returned to VA Boston.



An academic urologist her entire career, she has been involved in teaching HoLEP to residents and urologists at home and abroad for 20 years. She is currently a member of the American Urological Association's BPH Guidelines Committee and advocates conscientious approaches to benign prostate disease. Dr. Lerner has also been involved in CAUTI initiatives, contributing to the American Urological Association's white paper on CAUTI. She is a strong advocate of education about surgical energies, particularly laser energy, and has been involved in numerous initiatives and courses promoting education and training. She is also interested in, and has published, about issues of importance to women surgeons including pregnancy complications, fertility, and cancer.

Gregory F. Murphy, MD, FACS

Dr. Gregory Murphy, originally from Raleigh, graduated magna cum laude from Davidson College in 1985. He then attended UNC School of Medicine graduating with honors and a member of AOA. After doing his residency in urology and renal transplantation at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, he and his wife settled in Greenville, North Carolina to begin his practice. He and his wife, Wendy, have three children, all are either working or in graduate school. He was formerly president of Eastern Urological Associates in Greenville and Affiliate Professor and Chief of the Division of Urology at the ECU School of Medicine. He recently served as Davidson College's Alumni President and was on its Board of Trustees. Outside of work he has traveled extensively for the last 35 years to Third World countries including India, several parts of Africa, Nicaragua and Haiti as a medical missionary.



Dr. Murphy's professional career has been primarily one of clinical practice and administrative leadership positions. His surgical practice site is Vidant Medical Center, a 1,000-bed level one trauma center, which serves 29 eastern North Carolina counties. He served for three years as chief of staff of the Medical Center. He previously served on the board of the NC Urological Association, on the board of directors of the South Eastern Section of the American Urological Association and on the executive board of the Judicial and Ethics Committee for the American Urological Association as well as on the By-Laws Committee. He is a member in good standing of the North Carolina Institute of Medicine.

As a newcomer to politics, Dr. Murphy served in the North Carolina House of Representatives from 2015 to 2019. During his second term in the General Assembly, he served as senior chair of Health Policy and chair of Health and Human Services Appropriations. While he was successful in getting a variety of legislation passed, he was the primary sponsor of both the STOP Act and the HOPE Act, North Carolina's two main legislative actions to combat the opioid crisis. He led efforts to combat waste, fraud and abuse in the state's Medicaid system which saved the state hundreds of millions of dollars during his tenure.

Dr. Murphy, along with 25 other candidates, ran in a Special Election in 2019 to replace Congressman Walter B Jones, Jr., who passed away after serving the citizens of the North Carolina District 3 for more than 22 years. Running against 16 other Republicans, he came in first in the Primary but had to compete in a runoff two months later. He won the run off by more than 20 points and then won the General Election two months later with 61 percent of the vote. As a freshman in the US Congress, he serves on the Science and Technology Committee as well as the Education and Labor Committee.

Oluyemi O. Olumolade

Ms. Oluyemi Olumolade is a fourth-year medical student at the University of Michigan. She is the director of UroVersity, a mentorship-based pipeline initiative endowed by the University of Michigan's Urology Department. Ms. Olumolade is committed to increasing representation and visibility in medicine, as well as amplifying the voices and experiences of the most vulnerable

and often overlooked. She is on the board of advisors for the University of Michigan Asylum Collaborative, a multi-institutional partnership supported by Physicians for Human Rights. UMAC provides medical support for legal proceedings and affidavits of individuals seeking asylum. Ms. Olumolade is a strong advocate for her colleagues and she is excited for the future of medicine!



Ashish R. Parekh, MD

William C. Reha, MD, MBA

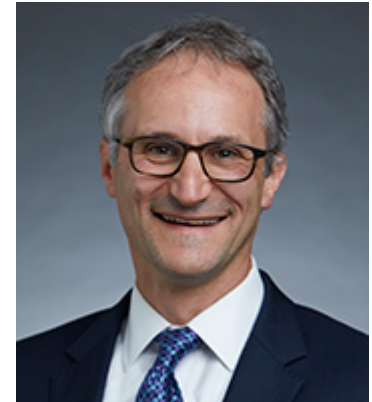

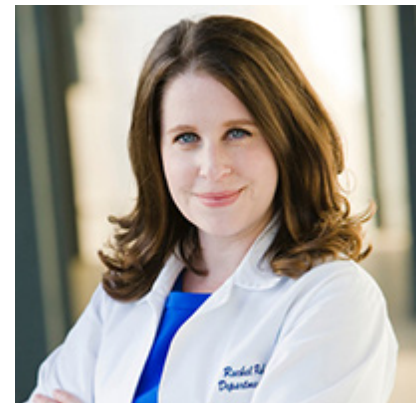
Jonathan N. Rubenstein, MD
